# **Letter From Richard Blood**

Grace to you, and peace,

Meeting with the CPM/CRE Committee last month, I was reminded again of just how important our Commissioned Ruling Elders (CREs) are to the ministry of the Presbytery of Northern Waters. The "average" PC(USA) congregation is small.

This is even more true now, as we move toward the end of "COVID time." People are still unsure about when it's safe to return to in-person worship, and are honestly just out-of-the habit of attending right now. This is true all over. Most of our congregations are running at somewhere around ½ the Sunday attendance they had before the pandemic. And this is not a local trend. It's happening all over the country, and in most denominations. It is what it is right now.

But too often, low attendance means low income, something our small congregations can't afford to begin with. How do we pay for trained, competent pastors? (And the Presbyterian Church has always stressed the importance of well-educated leaders.) One answer is trained ruling elders, (CREs) who can be commissioned by Presbytery to serve locally in most of the functions of Ministers of Word and Sacrament. The Presbytery of Northern Waters was a pioneer in training and commissioning ruling elders. We developed our own program, and have used CREs or lay pastors, for many years.

# **Letter from CPM**

### Who Me?

Have you ever sat in worship on a Sunday morning and thought to yourself: I can do that? Or perhaps "I can do that better?" You'd be amazed how many folks have just such thoughts. Yet we dismiss them as random thoughts, daydreaming. But suppose this is the Spirit calling you to a deeper commitment, to grow in your faith and challenge your discipleship? It's the way God works. It might be the way God is working in your life.

When asked such questions, individuals most often respond, "Who me?" We think of being called to ordained ministries, those that require seminary and degrees. We seldom think ourselves in that framework. And yet, as Rich mentions in his article, PCUSA, our presbytery is in desperate need of pastoral leadership. There are so many small, faithful fellowships in our midst, struggling to survive and be good witnesses in their communities, yearning for their own pastor. What's the answer?

One response is Commissioned Ruling Elders. Ruling elders are those in our local congregations we ordain for specific leadership roles, like serving on the session. But elders who undertake further study can become a pastor. These elders are known as Commissioned Ruling Elders (CREs).

# **Presbytery Meeting Highlights**

The Presbytery of Northern Waters held its 2022 spring meeting on May 5<sup>th</sup>, in person at Glen Avon Presbyterian Church, and virtually via Zoom.

The Rev. James Deters, Moderator, granted the Rev. Dorothy Duquette, 2021 Moderator, the honor of calling the meeting to order. After the declaration of a quorum, the Rev. Duquette opened the meeting with prayer at 9:49 am.

After a request to move Jackie Ranco's commissioning service to later in the meeting, the amended agenda was approved by the Presbytery.

The Rev Brad Carloss, Stated Clerk, reviewed the standing rules for this in person and virtual meeting. The Rev. Carloss then appointed Amanda Keppers as Roll and Minutes Clerk. There were no Corresponding Members to seat. The Stated Clerk moved to ratify all actions taken virtually by the Presbytery from April 2020 to the present (MSC.) The Rev. Carloss brought greetings from Nini Edwardo, Executive Secretary of the IEEP of Portugal, and thanked the Presbytery for prayers for his wife Sheryl after her heart attack, and reported she is doing well.

The Rev. James Deters, Moderator, received a motion to approve the Consent Agenda as written (MSC,) and reported on a special meeting of the Presbytery called to concur with a motion being brought to General Assembly encouraging environmental responsibility. The motion was approved at the special meeting, 96 percent in favor.

The Rev. Dorothy Duquette, Council Chair, brought two action items before the Presbytery on behalf of Council. The Presbytery approved the nomination of Deb Emory, CRE, to serve on the nominating committee, and voted to dismiss the Administrative Commission for the installation of the Rev. Jason Schiller at Community Presbyterian Church, Grand Rapids, with thanks.

The Rev. Barry Boyer, HR, Overtures and Bylaws Chair, recommended a change to our Manual of Operations requiring Boundaries Training every 3 years instead of every 5 years as in the past. The Rev. Robyn Weaver spoke on behalf of COM supporting the motion. (MSC.) Continued on Page 3

# **Presbytery Meeting Highlights Continued**

The Rev. Lon Weaver, Committee on Preparation for Ministry Chair, recommended Jocelyn Langholtz, a Ruling Elder from Ashland, be enrolled as an Inquirer for the Ministry of Word and Sacrament. Jocelyn spoke to the Presbytery about sense of calling to this path. After very positive discussion, the motion was moved, seconded, and carried. The Rev. Diana Bell led a prayer for Jocelyn as she moves through her discernment process.

The Rev. Richard Blood, General Presbyter, acting for Program Strategy, introduced two video Bible Studies in preparation for the 225 General Assembly. They were based on Hebrews 11, and focused on the theme of "Lament and Hope." These were the heart of our learning time.

The Revs. Robyn Weaver and Lawrence Lee, Co-Chairs of the Committee on Ministry, reported on ways God has been active and faithful in our Presbytery during this time of transition, while several congregations are looking for new pastoral leadership. Prayer was requested for Manitowish Waters, Lac du Flambeau, and Westminster as they seek God's guidance. Thanksgiving was offered for Wendy Christianson, coming to Virginia as Stated Supply, for the continuing ministry of Trinity Episcopal/Presbyterian Church in Park Rapids, and for exciting things happening at our Phillips Church. Rev Lee reported that all members of the Ironwood church have been put into the care of other congregations, and the building has been sold. There will be a celebration of the church's ministry at our October meeting. The Revs. Richard Blood and Brad Carloss reported for the First Pres Duluth Administrative Commission, that a joint meeting of the commission and the session is planned. The Rev. Joel Huenemann, Moderator at First, spoke of the congregation's deep emotional attachment to the building, while acknowledging an awareness that their current financial situation is unsustainable.

RE Paul Rigstad and the Rev. Robyn Weaver reported on a tumultuous year at Clearwater Forest. CF is celebrating a full complement of programs this summer after the struggles of COVID-19! Keep them in your prayers! It's been a hard year for the board however, dealing with major turnover in key staff positions, the total remodeling of Hallett Hall, the demolition of Osprey House, a flood in Eagle Lodge, and a fire in the Gate House kitchen.

# **Mission Spotlight- Chippewa Falls Presbyterian Church**

In June the State of Wisconsin recognized the work of the Open Door Clinic in Chippewa Falls by giving them at grant for \$120,000 which was presented to the Clinic by Lieutenant Governor Mandela Barnes.

The Clinic is housed in the First Presbyterian Church of Chippewa Falls where it has been since it opened in 2005.

During his visit, Barnes toured the facility and met with representatives of the Clinic and the church.

The Open Door Clinic, Inc. is a non-profit organization that provides basic health care services and a connection to community resources to Chippewa County residents who are without a health care alternative.

Nationally, it is estimated that eight to ten percent of the American population has no health insurance. In Chippewa County, that equates to 5,600 neighbors without health insurance. The Clinic, which is operated with the help of medical volunteers

- Provides basic health care services to uninsured.
- Provides basic lab testing.
- Provides basic pharmaceutical services.
- Assists patients with prescription program applications.

The Clinic, which is opened on Tuesday evenings from 5:00 to 7:30 provides medical services to Chippewa County residents who fall below 200% of the federal poverty level and are without health insurance.

They provide general medical services, pharmaceutical services, psychiatry, pulmonology, physical therapy and treatment from a chiropractor and dietician as necessary.

This is just one of the many projects available through the Chippewa Falls Presbyterian Church which has some to be known by many in the community as the "mission church".

# **Honing Hospitality** Speaker - Rev. Katie Estes

August 18 - 21, 2022 Optional Service Day August 17th

In contemporary culture, the term refers to the hotel and convention industry or to catering a meal and putting on a party, but hospitality means far more as a Christian practice. Hospitality is the offer to extend the privileges of community to those who do not have the standing to expect it, especially those who are vulnerable because they are strangers. Hospitality often involves sharing meals, but hospitality is about more than eating. Hospitality is an offer to identify with outsiders and to treat them like insiders.

All human life begins with God's act of hospitality-with God's making a place for us in the world that God created, a world that we had no claim to inhabit. God knew that this offer was dangerous because we the outsiders might defile the pristine world. But God welcomed us anyway. "Having been embraced by God, we must make space for others and invite them ineven our enemies," writes Miroslav Volf in his book Exclusion and Embrace. Hospitality is treating outsiders like insiders, just as God treated us.

We will use this weekend to hone our hospitality skills with God and with one another as we consider how we might practice a broader hospitality in the world.

In recent years we've moved towards a more standardized training process, and are currently using the "Academy," run by the Synod of Lakes and Prairies. It's a great program that brings in first-rate teachers, often during Synod School, to prepare lay leaders for many aspects of ministry in our congregations. We have a handful of wonderful, gifted participants in the Academy now, but could use more to fill the growing need in our many small congregations. Even some of our bigger churches are using CREs working under the supervision of Ministers of Word and Sacrament to augment their ministries.

Learning to listen to the wisdom of the past and face the challenges of a changing world is a life-long process for all of us. We can never afford to stop learning. That's why seminary-trained pastors are required to do on-going education. But CRE training, and the Academy in particular, is a great place to start in preparation for ministry in our congregations. Pastors, do you have people in your congregations with gifts God clearly wants to use who aren't in a place where seminary is feasible? Steer them towards our CRE program. Do you, a ruling elder, feel God may be calling you towards a bigger ministry in your congregation, or other congregations around you? Check out our CRE program and the Academy.

How? Get in touch with Lon Weaver, chair of the CPM/CRE program, or contact the PNW office and we can steer you in the right direction. Maybe God is calling you . . .

# **CPM Letter Continued – Who Me?**

Suppose you think you are experiencing just such a call. What do you do? Where do you start?

In a nutshell, here's the process for becoming a CRE.

- Pray
- Talk to your pastor. Explore your experience and questions together. Pray together.
- Contact a member of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry (CPM).
  The presbytery office has current contact information.
- Once you decide to become a candidate for the program, you must come "under care" of your session. That usually involves a vote by session, reflecting their commitment to support you in your training and a letter of recommendation to CPM. At the same time, CPM must also receive a letter of recommendation from your pastor.
- When CPM receives these recommendations, you will come "under care" of CPM itself. You will be given a liaison from CPM, who will be your primary contact throughout the process.
- The candidate will be asked by CPM to submit a "faith journey" statement and a Statement of Faith.
- Occupational experience and academic achievement as it's relevant to the CRE program will be explored with CPM.
- A program of studies is pursued in areas required by the Book of Order. Currently, this takes place through a synod-based program, The Academy. It takes about two years to complete all the courses.
- Candidates will complete a psychological evaluation and be found within clinical norms.
- After completing coursework and any other preparation CPM requires, the committee will meet with the candidate for a final evaluation. Following the evaluation, CPM will forward a recommendation to presbytery stating the candidate's readiness for a call and commissioning

Sounds complicated, doesn't it? But it's not. Your liaison from CPM will be there for you, to answer your questions and help you find your way through the forest of requirements. We look forward to meeting you, sharing the journey with you, and celebrating your commissioning with you.
